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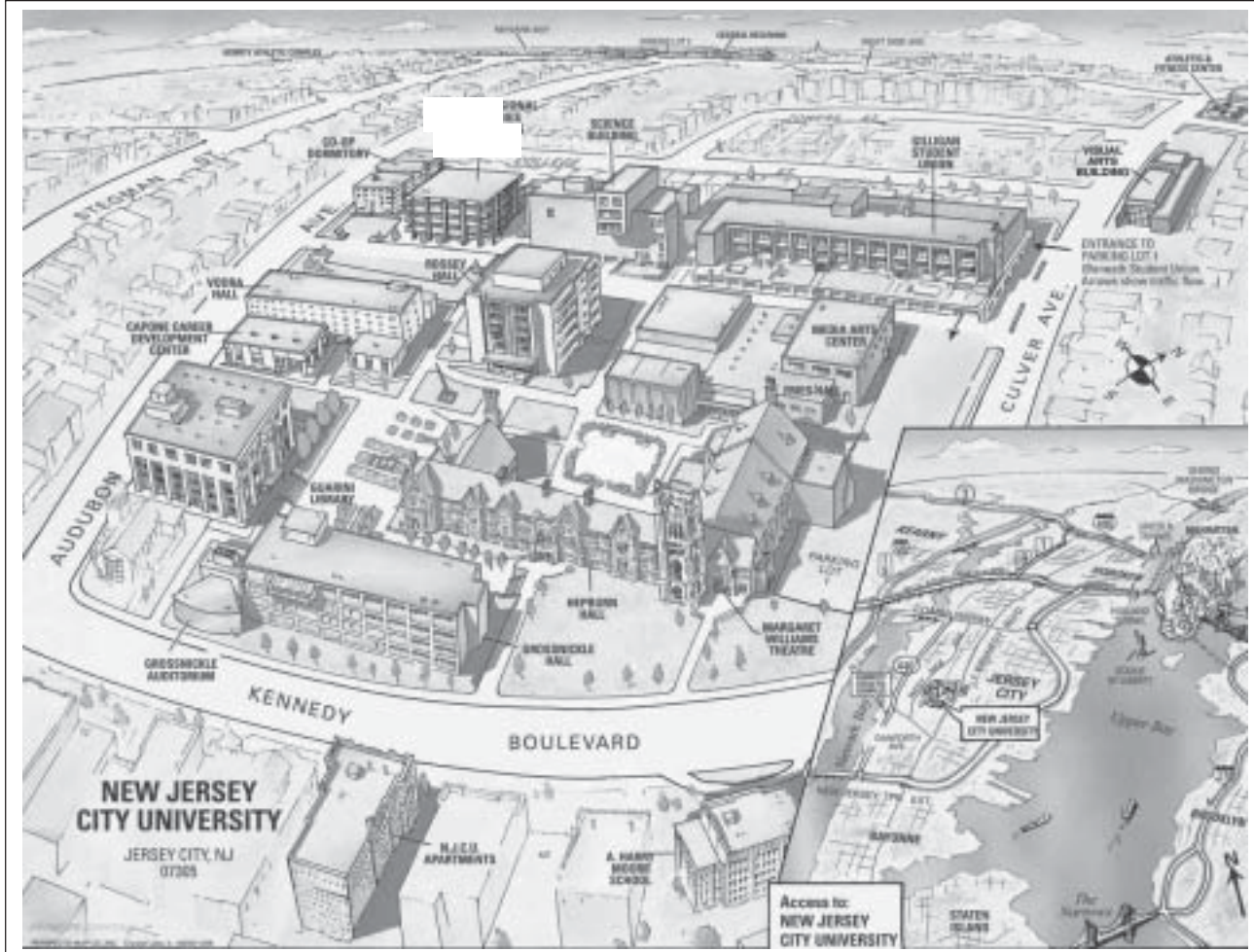

DIRECTIONS

By Car

From NJ Turnpike (Routes 280, 80, and 3):

Take 280 East, 80 East, or Route 3 East to the NJ Turnpike. Take Turnpike to Exit 15E. Pay toll, and follow signs to Routes 1 & 9 North (Truck Route). Go over two bridges to a traffic light. Stay straight at the light. After the McDonalds (on the right hand side) go to the 2nd traffic light and make a right turn on Kennedy Boulevard. NJCU is 12 blocks down on the right hand side. Parking is on Culver Avenue.

From Route 78 & Routes 1 & 9:

Take Route 78 East to Routes 1 & 9 North. Route 1 & 9 will split. Stay to the right (1 & 9 North Truck Route). Do not go to the Pulaski Skyway. Take 1 & 9 over two bridges to a traffic light. Stay straight at the light. After the McDonalds (on the right hand side) go to the 2nd traffic light and make a right turn on Kennedy Boulevard. NJCU is 12 blocks down on the right hand side. Parking is on Culver Avenue.

From the Garden State Parkway (Northbound):

Take the GSP North to Exit 140, Route 22 East. Take 22 East to Routes 1 & 9 North. Follow directions above from Routes 1 & 9.

From New York City (Holland Tunnel):

After exiting the Holland Tunnel, go straight and up the hill. Maneuver yourself into the center lanes (an exit for the Turnpike will be on the right; then an exit for Routes 1&9 will be on your left). Continue through approximately seven lights. You will come to a 'T'—this is Kennedy Blvd. Make a left onto Kennedy. At the fifth light, you will be entering Journal Square—follow Kennedy Blvd. as it turns right at Journal Square. Continue on Kennedy Blvd. to the University.

By Public Transportation

From the PATH Terminal at Journal Square:

Take the #10 South Boulevard bus directly to the University campus on Kennedy Boulevard; or take the #80 bus traveling south along West Side Avenue to Culver Avenue, and walk three blocks east to the University.

From New York City:

Take the #99S bus from the Port Authority Bus Terminal directly to the University, or take the PATH subway to Journal Square and follow the directions above.

To Register

 - e) Visiting students do not need to meet with an advisor to register. They report directly to the Registrar's Office, H-214.

II. REGISTRATION (ADVISEMENT/SEAT-RESERVATION/PAYMENT-DEFERMENT)

Pick up Master Course List and other materials outside the Registrar's Office, H-214, and complete the following three steps for registration. Extra Registration/Add/Drop cards and Change of Address forms are available on the table outside the Registrar's Office, H-214.

STEP 1 Advise ment - all students except Visiting Students make an appointment with your academic adviser starting March 14. Students with a major, contact the major department for an appointment. Students without a major, contact the Academic Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Rm. 101, to sign up for an appointment or call 200-3376/3422.

STEP 2A A Seat Reservation – Students who have met with their advisor will be eligible to do online self-registration, or they can report to the Registrar's Office Service Window, Hepburn 214. The Registration schedule is as follows:

Juniors:	Begins March 29,	10:00AM
Sophomores:	Begins April 5,	10:00AM
Open to All	Begins April 12,	10:00AM

STEP 2B. After Registrar's office hours, forms may be dropped in the Registrar's Office door mail-slot (H-214) or be mailed to the Registrar's Office, New Jersey City University, 2039 Kennedy Blvd., Jersey City, NJ 07305-1597.

STEP 3 Payment/Deferment of Tuition Charges must be completed at the Bursar's Office, H-106, by August 11.

A. Pay On-line: Go to <http://gothicnet.njcu.edu>, enter Gothic ID and password, from "My Menu", click on "My Finances" and select "make a Payment".

B. In-Person: A student pays or clears his tuition and fee charges at the Bursar's Office (H-106) from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30p.m. daily and evening hours are until 7:00 p.m. on July 19 and August 11.

C. By Mail:

1. Payment by check, money order or credit card: Discover (NOVUS) Visa or MasterCard - return your tuition bill along with payment. Include Social security number or I.D. number of student, undergraduate division, semester and year on check. DO NOT SEND CASH. All prior debts must be paid.

2. Clearance: If you have received an OFFICIAL AWARD NOTIFICATION from the Financial Aid Office covering your Fall enrollment, you may return your invoice to the Bursar's Office indicating that you are eligible for financial aid. Your award must be sufficient to cover the amount of your charges. New students, and those who have not filed for aid must submit their Financial Aid Forms no later than six weeks before the payment deadline of August 11.

3. Mailing address is: Bursar's Office, H-106, New Jersey City University, 2039 Kennedy Blvd., Jersey City, NJ 07305-1597.

III. NOTE: 1. After step 3 (clearance at the Bursar's Office) you have completed the registration process. Be sure you know the courses you registered for and the dates, times and rooms when they meet.

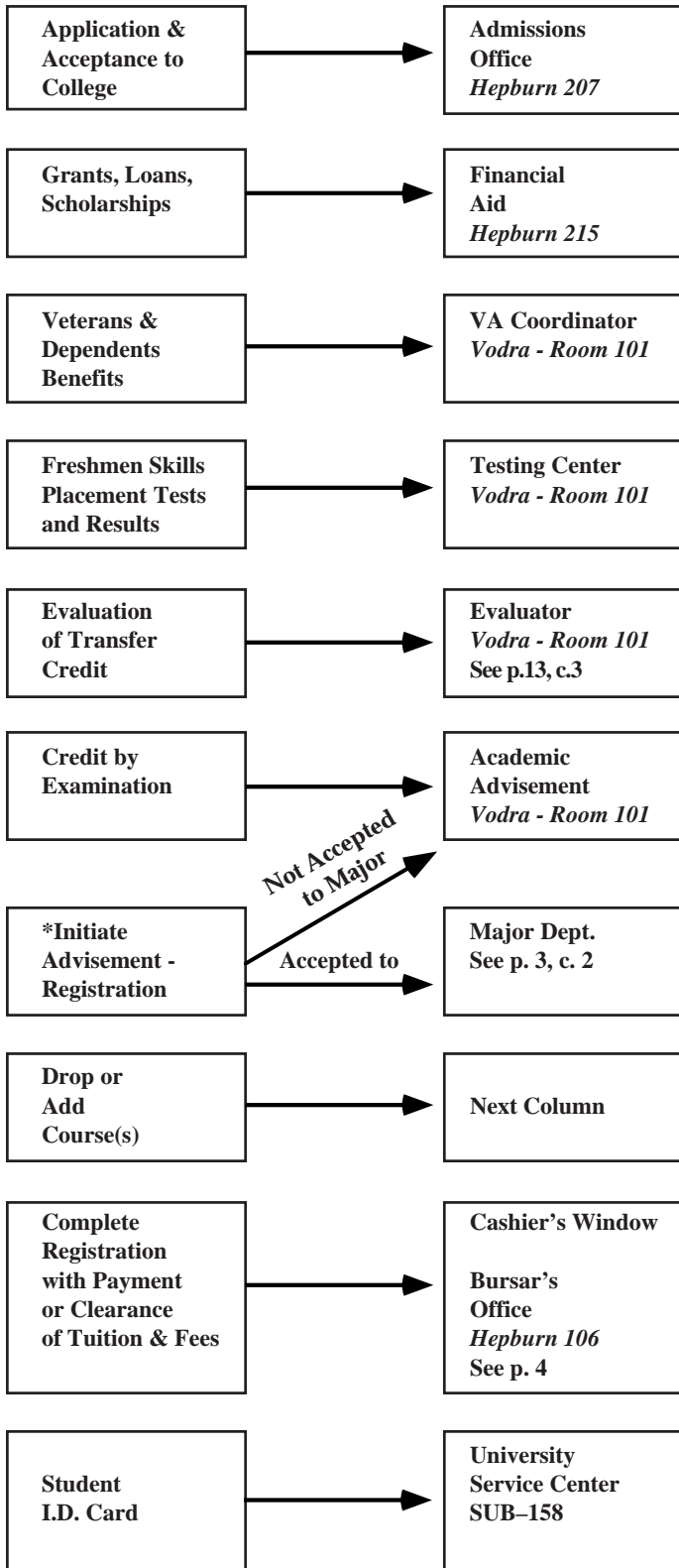

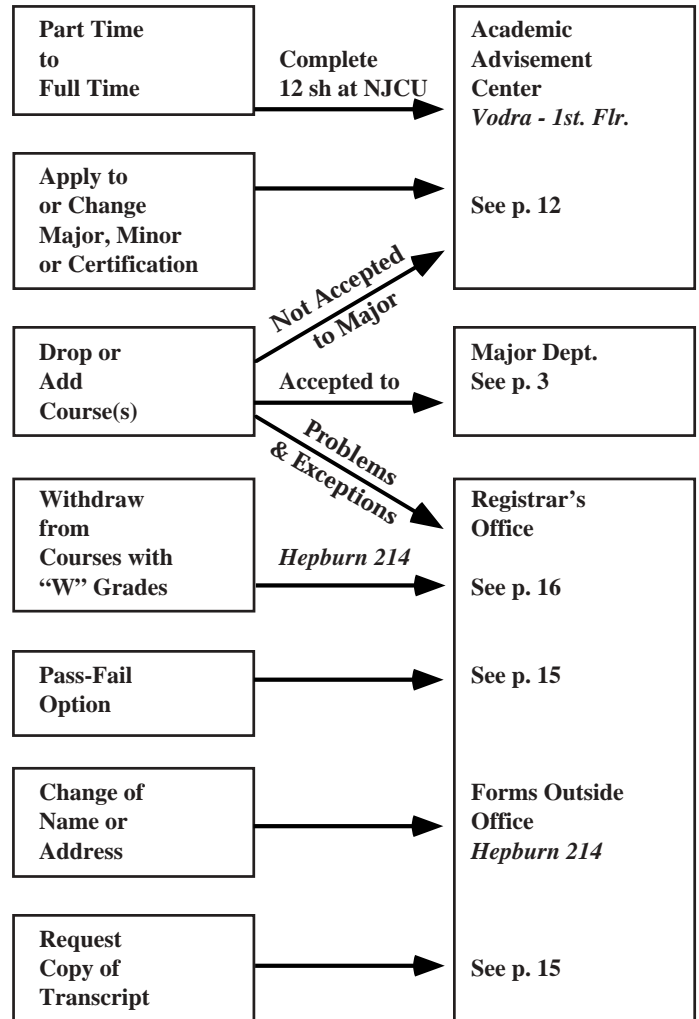

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS & POLICIES

ACADEMIC HONORS

Students with a semester average of 3.50 or better (minimum of 12 credits of computable grades) will be placed on the Dean's List. Students who have a cumulative average of 3.65 or better as they begin the spring semester at the University will be officially identified for honors in the Commencement program and designated as follows:

- 3.65-3.79 cum laude
- 3.80-3.89 magna cum laude
- 3.90-4.00 summa cum laude

based on a minimum of 32 credit hours in residence at New Jersey City University. Only graduates who achieve a cumulative average of 3.65 or better at completion of their final semester will have an honors notation made on their permanent records.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

(Effective Fall, 1984)

1. A student's academic standing is determined by a review of the student's cumulative grade point average. Failure to attain minimum levels according to the established regulations will result in academic probation or academic dismissal from the University.

2. A student will be placed on probation for the next semester for which the student enrolls if the cumulative grade point average falls below the following levels:

- 1.60 cumulative g.p.a. after a minimum of 13 credit hours attempted.
- 1.75 cumulative g.p.a. after a minimum of 24 credit hours attempted.
- 1.85 cumulative g.p.a. after a minimum of 48 credit hours attempted.
- 2.0 cumulative g.p.a. after a minimum of 72 credit hours attempted.
- 2.0 cumulative g.p.a. is required for graduation.

3. A student on probation should not enroll for more than 13 credits during a semester or the 12 credits maximum allowed in the combined summer sessions.

4. Probation is removed when the student's cumulative grade point average reaches the appropriate level.

5. A student on probation who achieves a semester average of 2.50 or better during the probationary semester may continue with his/her studies.

6. A student on probation who achieves a semester average lower than 2.50 during the probationary semester will be dismissed. Any appeal of this dismissal must be made to the Dean of Students, requesting reinstatement. The appeal must be in writing and must be submitted within two (2) weeks of receipt of official notice of dismissal. The Dean of Students will convene the Academic Dismissal Appeals Committee, which will review the

appeal and make a recommendation to the Dean. The decision of the Dean of Students is final.

7. A student who is dismissed from the University may not be considered for readmission for one calendar year after the date of dismissal.

8. A second academic dismissal is final.

ACADEMIC GRIEVANCE

/APPEAL PROCEDURES

(Effective Spring, 2004)

The following procedure is available to resolve grievances regarding grading, course requirements, attendance, academic integrity, and other academically related complaints:

Step 1. Meeting and discussion with the faculty member involved to resolve the situation in question must take place within forty-five (45) days of the last day of the semester on which the grievance is based. At the conclusion of the meeting, the faculty member will inform the student of a decision.

Step 2. The student may initiate a written appeal with the faculty member within ten (10) calendar days of notification of the decision of the faculty member; the faculty member will respond in writing within ten (10) calendar days of the date of receipt of the written appeal. Should the faculty member fail to respond within ten (10) calendar days, the student may present his/her written appeal to the next level of review, the department chairperson, with ten (10) calendar days.

Step 3. Written appeal to the appropriate department chairperson within ten (10) calendar days of notification of a decision pursuant to the previous step or upon failure of the faculty member to respond within the prescribed ten (10) calendar days.

Step 4. Written appeal to the appropriate Academic Dean within ten (10) calendar days of notification of a decision pursuant to the previous step. The appropriate dean shall provide the student with a written decision within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the appeal from Step 3.

Step 5. Written appeal to the University Senate Student Affairs Committee within ten (10) calendar days of notification of a decision pursuant to the previous step.

Grievances that are not resolved at the dean's level may be referred to the Student Affairs Committee of the University Senate for review and decision, which will be forwarded to the Vice President for Academic Affairs for final decision.

The Student Affairs Committee of the University Senate shall deal with grievances involving grading, course requirements, attendance, academic integrity, and other academically related complaints after Steps

1-4 above have been exhausted. The committee shall include at least one faculty or professional staff member from each of the Colleges and one student. The Vice President of Student Affairs or Associate Vice President of Student Affairs will serve as a non-voting, ex-officio member of this Committee. The Student Affairs Committee shall deal with grievances initiated by students. The Committee may choose to invite parties involved to meet with the committee to present their positions or to proceed on the written record generated from the appeal process detailed above.

Within twenty (20) days of receipt of a written appeal from a student, the committee shall (a) determine that the appeal has basis in fact; (b) inform the complainant of the legal and administrative limitations of the committee in resolving grievances; and (c) determine that all normal avenues of appeal resolution, between the parties involved, and the applicable department chair and dean, have been exhausted. It shall provide notice of its decision, made on a review and advise basis, to the Vice President for Academic Affairs, who renders a final decision within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving the Student Affairs Committee's recommendation.

FINAL APPEAL: Only cases that result in expulsion may be appeal to the President. In these cases, the decision of the President is final and there is no further recourse at the University. The charged student will have ten (10) calendar days from the date of the decision by the Vice President for Academic Affairs to file an appeal with the President of the University. All appeals must be in writing. In cases resulting in expulsion, the President of the University shall render a final decision within twenty (20) calendar days of receiving the appeal.

ADVISORS

First-semester freshmen and new transfer students who have not yet decided on their major program are assigned by the University Advisement Center to a general studies advisor. The general studies advisor will advise the student until (s)he is accepted into a major.

1. Students accepted into a major report to their major departmental advisor for advisement.
2. Students not yet accepted into a major (i.e. undecided and unclassified) report to Vodra Hall, Room 101 for advisement.
3. Students coded unclassified report to the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101 for advisement.
4. Students coded Saturday Semester Program report to Hepburn 201 for advisement.
5. OSP students report to Vodra Hall, 2nd floor.

6. TLC Students report to Hepburn 112E for advisement.

7. Students receiving V.A. Educational benefits (i.e. veterans or dependents of veterans) must make an appointment to discuss their program and current academic status with the Coordinator of Veteran's Affairs, at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101, 200-3300.

ADVANCE CREDIT

1. Advance Credit by Examination and Experience, Advanced Placement High School Courses, and Other Courses or Programs Recognized by the American Council on Education. A student may achieve advance standing by presenting evidence of knowledge gained through experiential learning outside the classroom, which is evaluated through the following examination programs: the University-Level Examination Program (CLEP), American University Testing Program (ACT/PEP), University Proficiency Examination Program (CPEP), and departmental challenge examinations. The student must submit examination scores meeting the criteria for credit.

A student may also achieve advanced standing by presenting evidence of knowledge gained through the successful completion of Advanced Placement high school courses. United States Armed Forces Institute courses, also military, non-collegiate courses, and training programs recognized by the American Council on Education.

2. Advance Credit by Transfer. Transfer credit is granted for courses, completed at another institution with a minimum grade of "C", that are applicable to the student's degree requirements at New Jersey City University. Generally, transfer students will be expected to satisfy their major program requirements in residence at New Jersey City University. An academic department or an interdepartmental committee offering a major in a degree program, under the recommendation of the student's department chairperson, may approve the application of some transfer credits to the requirements of the major. Transfer credit will only be accepted as satisfying major requirements if the department chairperson or appropriate department committee accepts the transfer credit.

A student seeking to transfer to New Jersey City University must submit official transcripts of all credits completed at other institutions at the time of application to the University. The only exception to this are credits being earned elsewhere at the time of NJCU application. For these credits, a student must submit a final official transcript no later than October 15 for Fall applicants and February 28 for Spring applicants.

3. Advance Credit by Transfer with an A.A. or A.S. Degree from an

Accredited Two-Year or Four-Year College in the State of New Jersey.

Graduates from accredited two-year or four-year colleges in the State of New Jersey, with an A.A. or A.S. degree, and, who have earned a cumulative grade point average (c.g.p.a.) of at least 2.0 (on a scale of 4.0), will be able to transfer a block of credits, not to exceed a maximum of 66 credits, to New Jersey City University, thereby satisfying the University's general studies requirement.

APPLICATION FOR DECLARATION OF MAJOR PROGRAM OF STUDY

When degree students apply for acceptance into their major program, they must file the Declaration of Major Program of Study Form at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101. New transfer students should apply for admission to a major program at the beginning of their first semester at the University. Freshmen should apply for acceptance into the major after completing all undergraduate required courses and approximately 30 degree credits. Prospective music majors must audition in person before the Music Department faculty.

A minimum cumulative average of 2.0 is generally required for admission to the major. A department may refuse to accept a student in its program if the student's work in Core Courses already completed is below a "C". Specific information on departmental requirements for admission to a major program is available from the department concerned.

It is University policy that no student will be accepted to a major until he/she has passed and/or been tested out of the Academic Foundations Program.

Veterans or dependents of veterans receiving VA benefits must declare a major upon the accumulation of 32 semester hours provided the student has also achieved an acceptable grade point average.

If the student is granted admission to the major program, (s)he will receive a copy of the provisionally approved application, and a copy will be forwarded to the major department. The student will be assigned to an advisor for the major program. Students are approved conditionally for admission to the major contingent upon satisfactory progress in the major program.

Students interested in an Education major will be provisionally accepted into the major as early as the second semester at the University with a GPA of 2.75. Other requirements must be met before formal admission into the program. A list of these requirements can be obtained from the academic department or the advisement center. A passing score on the appropriate state licensing exam is required before registering for the education Internship. Information on this exam can be obtained at the Center for Teacher Preparation and

Partnerships in P203A. All requirements are subject to change because of state licensing regulations.

APPLICATION FOR

MINOR PROGRAM OF STUDY

Students wishing to pursue a minor program of study must file the Declaration of Minor Program at the Academic University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Each faculty member has full responsibility for determining the purposes of class meetings of courses for which he or she is responsible. At the first meeting of the class, each student shall receive a written statement of the requirements for the course, including those of attendance, as demanded by the nature and purposes of the course.

Each student is expected to fulfill the attendance requirements as determined by the faculty member. Failure to attend classes without a valid excuse as determined by the faculty member may be factored into the evaluation of the student's performance and achievement for the course.

Each student shall be required to take all examinations on the days scheduled for such, provided these schedules are announced in advance by the faculty member(s) responsible for the course.

To ensure compliance with Federal and State aid requirements, instructors are required to keep such records as will enable them to complete the Monthly Veterans Attendance Rosters and the Mid-Semester Audit Report Forms and to certify the last date of attendance of students receiving aid.

Financial aid recipients who never attend one or more of their classes or who stop attending all of their classes will be paid a reduced amount of aid and are subject to forfeiture of their financial aid.

CANCELLATION OF

COURSE AND STAFFING

The University reserves the right to cancel any courses for which enrollment is insufficient. Cancelled courses are dropped by the computer from the student's schedule and the student is eligible for a 100% refund of said courses if registered for less than twelve credits. The student has the option to accept the refund or add another course to his/her schedule. Adding a course must be accomplished before the end of the Add/Drop period. If a degree student adds a course with a different course title, then an adviser's signature is required.

The University also reserves the right to change faculty assignments and therefore cannot guarantee students faculty of their choice.

CHANGES OF MAJOR

A student may change his/her major by filing the Application to Change Major

Program of Study Form at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101.

Change of Enrollment Status

1. A currently enrolled, degree seeking, part-time student, who wishes to change to full-time enrollment status the next semester is eligible to do so once:

a) He/she has completed a minimum of twelve (12) college level credits at NJCU and

b) Achieved a minimum cumulative gpa of 2.0

c) A Change of Enrollment for Continuing Students Form must be filed at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall.

2. A currently enrolled "unclassified" part-time student, who wishes to change to degree study is eligible to do so once:

a) He/she has completed a minimum of twelve (12) college level credits at NJCU and

b) Achieved a minimum cumulative gpa of 2.0

c) A Change of Enrollment for Continuing Students Form must be filed at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall.

d) The student must take the University's basic skills test. Arrangements for the test may be made at the same office.

COURSE LOAD

AND OVERLOAD OPTIONS

Each full-time undergraduate student must register for a minimum of twelve (12) credits each regular semester. This is the course load required of full-time undergraduates.

Overload is defined as registering for more than twelve (12) credits for a regular semester as a full-time undergraduate. There are restrictions on when and how a full-time undergraduate may register for an overload:

1) Full-time undergraduates on academic probation may register for a maximum of thirteen (13) credits and/or semester hours for the semester(s) they are on probation.

2) A full-time undergraduate who has not completed, with passing grades, all the courses below the 100 level s/he is required to take a maximum of sixteen (16) credits and semester hours.

3) Only full-time undergraduates who have completed, with passing grades, the All University Requirement courses and all courses below the 100 level which may have been required are eligible to register for more than sixteen (16) credits, according to the following standards:

Cumulative GPA	Overload Permitted for a Regular Semester
Between 2.5 and 3.5	Maximum of 19 credits, with permission of the dean*
≥3.5	Maximum of 22 credits, with permission of the dean*

*With permission of the dean of the college in which the student has been accepted into a major, or for students not yet accepted into a major, by the Dean of the William J. Maxwell College of Arts and Sciences.

NOTE: A maximum of six (6) credits and/or semester hours is allowed per summer session. No overload is allowable for a summer session.

COURSES AT ANOTHER INSTITUTION

If an NJCU student wishes to take a course at another institution, the student must obtain permission, in the form of a signed waiver, prior to taking the desired course. Waiver forms are available at the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101.

If a student wishes to substitute a course from another institution for a general studies requirement, he/she must submit an Application for Waiver of General Studies Requirement, with the signature of his/her advisor to the Dean of Arts and Sciences, to request the Dean's approval. Upon approval, the waiver will be forwarded to the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101. If a student wishes to substitute a course from another institution, for a requirement in his/her major, the student must submit a Waiver of Major Requirement, with the signatures of his/her faculty advisor and (major) department chairperson to the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall.

The student must obtain a grade of "C" or better to receive transfer credit for a course taken at another institution.

An NJCU matriculated student cannot receive financial aid as a visiting student at another school. However, the student should check with the financial aid office of the school he/she is visiting to determine whether there can be (or is) a consortium agreement with NJCU, for purposes of enrollment there. Such an agreement must be reviewed and processed by the financial aid offices at each school. Supporting statements indicating that the course(s) will be credited toward a student's degree requirements must also be submitted.

COURSE WAIVERS

Waiver of a General Studies Requirement. If an advisor wishes to substitute a non-general studies NJCU course for a general studies requirement, the student must submit a Waiver, with the advisor's signature, to the Dean of Arts and Sciences, to request the Dean's approval. If the Waiver is signed by the Dean, it must be brought, by the student, to the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall.

Waiver of Major Requirement. If a student wishes to substitute another NJCU course for a requirement in the major, the student must submit a Waiver, with the signatures of his/her faculty advisor and (major) department chairperson. If the Waiver is signed by both these parties, it must be brought, by the

student, to the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for graduation from New Jersey City University with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, or Bachelor of Science, a student must fulfill the following requirements:

1. A minimum of 128 credits of baccalaureate study.

2. A minimum cumulative average of 2.00 (C average).

3. A minimum of 32 credits in residence at New Jersey City University.

4. Completion of a course of study leading to the bachelor's degree which includes:

a. Completion of the University's general education requirements as described in the University catalog and Academic Planning sheet.

b. Completion of at least 36 credits in an approved major as outlined in the catalog by the department offering the major, and achievement of a cumulative average of at least 2.00 in the major.

c. Recommendation for graduation by the faculty of the University. NOTE: Academic Foundations courses: students admitted to NJCU who are found to be deficient in English, Reading and/or Mathematics, are required to take certain Academic Foundations courses (below 100 level). Although these courses are credit bearing, they do not count toward the required 128 credits needed for graduation with a bachelor's degree.

5. A candidate with a bachelor's degree from a college recognized by an American accrediting agency may apply for admission to NJCU for a second baccalaureate degree by applying to the Admissions Office for acceptance to the University and completing at least an additional 36 credits in residence beyond the first degree. These credits must fulfill all the requirements for the new degree.

If the candidate is a graduate of New Jersey City University or another accredited American college, prior credits earned will be recognized as having satisfied all General Studies requirements and elective requirements.

Grade Point Averages: The numbers in parentheses represent index values used to compute grade point averages. The number of credits/semester hours assigned to the course multiplied by the grade index received gives the grade points earned for that course.

The sum total of grade points earned divided by total credits attempted constitutes the student's grade point average.

IN (Incomplete) Grade: The "IN" grade is to be used only in extraordinary circumstances when a student may be granted further time to complete the required course work. The final deadline date for revision of "IN" is six weeks after the beginning of the subsequent semester, e.g.:

1. "IN" grade for the Fall Semester must be satisfied by the sixth week of the following Spring Semester.

2. "IN" grade for the Spring Semester or the Summer Sessions must be satisfied by the sixth week of the following Fall Semester.

"IN" grades that are not resolved by the deadline date will automatically be converted to "F" grades.

W (official withdrawal) Grade:

This grade will only be applicable to the student who officially withdraws from a course by filing a completed withdrawal form with the Office of the Registrar. The deadline dates for filing are November 15 for the Fall Semester; April 15 for the Spring Semester. The mid-semester point for Summer Sessions is the deadline for these sessions. For all officially withdrawn students, the instructor's final grade roster will have the grade "W" imprinted in the grade column next to the student's name. A student who does not complete course work and does not officially withdraw will receive the grade of "F". In extraordinary circumstances, such as hospitalization for an accident or illness, a student may submit a written request to the appropriate academic dean for an official withdrawal after the deadline date. Such requests must be accompanied by appropriate documentation of the time and nature of the circumstances. Decisions by the Academic Dean on these requests are final.

To obtain a refund, students are required to file an official form according to the Refund Schedule posted by the Registrar. A partial refund is available only within the first third of each semester or summer session.

R Grade: This grade will only be used in Academic Foundations courses. The grade is given to a student who demonstrates progress in the course but not sufficient progress to warrant a passing grade. The student who

receives an "R" grade must either repeat the course or demonstrate sufficient progress to participate at the next level of course work. Students are allowed to receive one "R" grade per course. When the course is repeated, an "F" grade results in dismissal from the University. Letter grade (A through D) issued in Academic Foundation courses (catalog number less than 100) are not calculated in the grade point average.

NOTE: The grades "W" (Withdrawal), "P" (Pass) and "R" (Repeat-Academic Foundations) do not affect the grade point average; however, an excessive number of "W" grades can adversely affect a student's eligibility to receive various types of financial aid, and "R" grades are limited to Academic Foundations courses. "R" grades do not count toward degree requirements or graduation.

Grade access: Grades will be posted on-line 3 weeks after the last day of the semester. Grade reports are no longer mailed to students. Grades can be accessed via the Internet at GothicNet.

GRADE RECOMPUTATION POLICY (Effective Spring 1992 Semester)

1) A student can repeat a course and elect once to have the lower grade received for that course excluded from the grade point - GPA.

2) All grades will remain on the official transcript. An explanation of this policy appears on the transcript.

3) Any course may be repeated subject to department policies restricting students from repeating an elementary course once a more advanced course has been completed. No substitutions are allowed.

4) A student may elect grade recomputation for not more than 16 credits.

5) The student electing grade recomputation must make the election by filing a grade recomputation form with the Registrar, H-214.

6) The election is not automatic. A student who fails to file the proper form will have both grades included in the GPA.

7) This policy is not retroactive. Courses repeated prior to the effective date of this policy are not eligible for grade recomputation.

8) This policy does not apply to students who have graduated.

9) Credit for courses repeated are applicable only once toward the degree.

10) If a student officially withdraws from a course in which the grade computation option is made, the option becomes void.

Please note that the Veterans Administration education benefits are not payable for courses previously completed, unless the completed course has a grade of "F" or the course has a minimum grade requirement for the student's major program of study. For additional information on the above policy

or veterans affairs, please contact the Coordinator of Veterans Affairs in the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101, or call 201-200-3005.

GRADUATION AND CERTIFICATION **DEADLINE DATES AND FORMS FOR UNDERGRADUATES**

A senior eligible for graduation/certification must complete the Intent To Graduate Card, and Application for Certification if applicable, at the Registrar's Office Hepburn 214, 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. during the Fall and Spring semesters or 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Office of Academic Services for Evening Students (OASES), Congressman Frank J. Guarini Library, RM 10. Deadlines are:

1. May 18 to June 16, if the student expects to complete all requirements by the end of the Summer I or II Sessions. Transcripts and diplomas will be dated August 15 and diplomas will be available October 15.

Students applying for graduation clearance and completing degree requirements in Summer 2005 Session/s are eligible to participate in the May 2006 commencement.

2. August 1 to September 30, if the student expects to complete all requirements by the end of the fall semester. Transcripts and diplomas will be dated January 31, and diplomas will be available by March 15.

3. December 1 to January 31, if the student expects to complete all requirements by the end of the spring semester, transcripts and diplomas will be dated the date of Commencement and diplomas will be available by June 15. Students who applied for Graduation clearance in the spring semester and were denied because of missing 6 or less credits will be eligible to request permission to walk in the Spring 2005 commencement after registering for summer session.

3. The Dean of Students will forward a letter during March to each graduating senior regarding participation in the May Commencement.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Independent study consists of projects which are problem-centered and action-research oriented and may be undertaken on a variable credit basis. The William J. Maxwell College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Professional Studies and the College of Education currently limit undergraduates to six (6) credits of independent study.

MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

Each student must complete a major program of at least 36 credits, as determined by the department administering the program.

1. Students majoring in one of the approved programs should consult with the chairperson of that program and obtain a printed copy of the specific courses and requirements of the major program of study of their interest.

2. Also, students interested in Teacher Education programs should consult with the appropriate chairperson(s) and obtain a printed copy of the courses and requirements of the program of study.

MATRICULATION

Matriculation is admission to the University as a Degree student.

PASS/FAIL OPTION

Pass/Fail Forms are available across from the Registrar's Office Service Window, H-214. After Office hours, forms may be completed and placed in the door mail slot. Students have the option of requesting a final grade of PASS or FAIL instead of a letter grade in an elective, and/or non-major course, in a general studies course (but not an AUR or Core course), or academic minor. The Pass/Fail Option is limited to nine credits. No more than one course per semester may be elected under this option. Pass/Fail evaluation is interpreted to mean a grade of "Pass" for satisfactory completion of course requirements and a grade of "Fail" for unsatisfactory completion of course requirements. When the "Pass" grade is achieved, the credits assigned are indicated as earned but the student's cumulative average remains unaffected. Only the grade of "F" negatively affects the cumulative average.

An elective is interpreted to mean any course outside the major and not specifically required in the student's program. At the discretion of any department, certain courses within the major field can be designated "Pass/Fail". The Pass/Fail option may be exercised only during the first five days of class following the add-drop period in the Fall or Spring Semester, and during the four days of classes following the Add/Drop period for Summer I and II Sessions. Each student must complete a Pass/Fail option form at the Registrar's Office, H-214.

REFUND OF TUITION AND FEES

Students who withdraw from courses will receive a refund of tuition charges and fees according to the schedule listed below. For specific dates, see the Undergraduate Academic Calendar on the back cover of this booklet. IN COMPUTING REFUNDS THE DATE OF WITHDRAWAL IS THE DATE ON WHICH THE OFFICE OF THE REGISTRAR RECEIVES FROM THE STUDENT AN OFFICIAL DROP CARD OR WITHDRAWAL FORM.

a. Withdrawal from course(s) before the end of add/drop permits a 100% reduction of charges for each credit below twelve credits.

b. Withdrawal from course(s) during the first third of the semester but after add/drop permits a 50% reduction of charges for each credit below twelve credits.

c. Withdrawal from course(s) after the first third of the semester does not permit any reduction of charges.

If classes are canceled by the University, tuition and service charges are refunded in full.

Late fee charges are not refunded.

Requests or recommendations for refunds of tuition and fees after deadline dates are forwarded in writing to the Registrar H-214.

REPEATED COURSES

A student MUST repeat a course he/she has failed if the specific course is required for graduation. When a course is repeated, both the original course and grade and the subsequent course and grade are reflected on the transcript, BUT the credit is counted ONLY ONCE TOWARD THE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS. Students may elect to omit computation of the lower grade of a repeated course from their grade point-GPA. Read Grade Recomputation Policy for details on page 14.

RESIDENCE FOR TUITION PURPOSES

Tuition is assessed according to the student's legal and permanent residence at the time of admission to the University. A student who becomes a legal and permanent resident of New Jersey subsequent to his admission to the University must directly contact the Registrar, H-214, and submit the required documentary evidence prescribed by law.

SENIOR CITIZENS

1. Senior citizens who are residents of New Jersey may attend courses without charge on a non-credit, space available basis by securing from the Registrar a letter of introduction to the faculty member teaching the course.

2. Senior citizens may also enroll in courses for credit with a tuition waiver under certain circumstances. Interested senior citizens may contact the Registrar's Office, Hepburn Hall, Rm. 214, for the details of this arrangement.

SUMMER SESSIONS AT NJCU

During Summer Session I & II a student may register for a maximum of six (6) credits for each session. Each session is five weeks.

TRANSCRIPTS

To request a transcript the student or graduate has four options.

1. In person: at the Registrar's Office Hepburn 214 on a form supplied by the office

2. By mail: send a signed letter to the Registrar's Office, c/o Transcripts, New Jersey City University, 2039 Kennedy Boulevard Jersey City, NJ 07305.

3. By the Internet: www.studentclearinghouse.org Students may request separate undergraduate and graduate transcripts but no portion of the undergraduate or graduate record may be deleted. Procedures for the issuance of transcripts are governed by the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 as amended (Final Regulations, 41 Fed. Reg. 24662 399.33).

Transcripts are prepared by the Registrar's Office in accordance with the policies of the

American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Officers of Admission. Where New Jersey City University transcripts show credit hours earned at other institutions the official transcripts from those institutions have become a part of the student's permanent file in the Registrar's Office. New Jersey City University does not make copies of another institution's transcripts. To obtain such transcripts, the student must contact the institution concerned. Transcripts should be requested at least ten days prior to the time needed.

An official charge of \$3.00, or \$10.00 for same day service, will be made for each transcript requested. No transcript of credits will be granted to any student until all fees and other University obligations have been adjusted.

Effective July 1, 2005, a one-time transcript fee of \$25.00 will be charged to all students whose first term at NJCU is Fall 2005.

The Registrar's Office has the right to deny a transcript request to any student who abuses this service. Limit of transcript requests per year is 10 transcripts for regular service. A \$10.00 fee will be charged for 1 hour service.

VISITING STUDENTS

a. DURING THE FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS, a formal application to NJCU is not required. The visiting student presents to the Registrar's Office, H-214 a permission letter from the university the student is attending stating the course titles, and authorized by a proper authority.

b. DURING THE SUMMER SESSIONS, a formal application to New Jersey City University is not required. The visiting student presents to the Registrar:

1) a permission letter from the university the student is attending stating the course titles, and authorized by a proper authority or

2) a copy of a university transcript, or

3) a photostat of the student's high school diploma.

However, high school seniors who will graduate in the immediate future must submit a signed letter from the high school certifying their status as a senior and the expected date of graduation.

Visiting students do not need the academic advisor's signature on their Advisement/Registration Forms.

c. GRADES FOR VISITING STUDENTS. Grades will be posted on-line 3 weeks after the last day of the semester. Visiting students should write to the New Jersey City University Registrar's Office, c/o Transcripts and request an official transcript to be sent to the university of his/her choice and specify the department and/or person in the department who should receive it. A fee of \$3.00 is required; \$10.00 for same day service.

d. FINANCIAL AID FOR VISITING STUDENTS. A visiting student cannot receive financial aid from New Jersey City University. Visiting students should check with their school's Financial Aid Office to see if it can

enter into a Consortium Agreement with New Jersey City University for purposes of the student's enrollment at NJCU. All requests for these Agreements must be reviewed and processed by the Financial Aid Offices at each school. Supporting statements indicating that these courses will be credited toward the student's degree requirements must also be submitted to the home school.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

The Coordinator of Veterans Affairs is located in the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101. S/he assists veterans and eligible dependents of veterans with:

Certification of veterans to the Veterans Administration for education benefits.

Processing of Veterans Tuition Credit Programs forms (VTCP) for students eligible to receive such grants from the State of New Jersey.

Academic advisement and approval of proposed schedules during advisement/registration periods are provided by the major advisor or academic advisor. Veterans should schedule an appointment with the Coordinator of Veterans Affairs each semester, to discuss benefits and their academic status.

For additional information on veterans' affairs, contact the Coordinator of Veterans Affairs in the University Advisement Center, Vodra Hall, Room 101, or call 201-200-3300.

ADMINISTRATIVE WITHDRAWAL

The University reserves the right to administratively withdraw or deny registration to any student who fails to comply with institutional policies and regulations.

VOLUNTARY WITHDRAWAL

Students who find it necessary to withdraw from the University must arrange an appointment with a counselor in the Psychological Services Center at 54 College Street (200-3165). Each student who withdraws from the University must also OFFICIALLY withdraw from courses, at the Registrar's Office, H-214. See directions below.

WITHDRAWAL FROM A COURSE

Academic Foundation courses cannot be dropped or withdrawn from without the approval of the Office of the Dean of Arts & Sciences in H-306. A student who has earned thirty (30) credits or more cannot drop or withdraw from an All University Requirement (Tier I) course, except in exchange for a different section of the same course or with the approval of the Office of the Dean of Arts & Sciences. A student who has earned sixty (60) credits or more cannot drop or withdraw from an All University Requirement (Tier II) course, except in exchange for a different section of the same course or with the approval of the Office of the Dean of Arts & Sciences, or if this action is recommended by the

related academic department as a result of the confirming placement test. Withdrawal forms are available opposite the Registrar's Office service window, H-214. After office hours, forms may be completed and placed in the door mail-slot.

1. DURING ADD/DROP PERIOD: Students can complete an add/drop thru self-service or complete a Drop form and submit to the Registrar's Office H-214 on days assigned for add/drop. This course(s) will not be recorded on the student's transcript and a 100% refund of tuition and fees will be granted for each credit below 12 credits.

2. BETWEEN ADD/DROP AND THE FIRST THIRD OF THE SEMESTER: Students must complete an official Withdrawal Form at the Registrar's Office H-214. This course will receive a "W" grade on the transcript and the student will receive a 50% refund of applicable tuition and fees for each credit below 12 credits.

3. AFTER THE FIRST THIRD OF SEMESTER TO NOVEMBER 15 FOR FALL SEMESTER TO APRIL 15 FOR SPRING SEMESTER OR TO MID-SEMESTER FOR SUMMER SESSIONS: Students must complete an official Withdrawal Form at the Registrar's Office, H-214. This course(s) will receive a "W" grade on the transcript and the student is not entitled to any refund.

4. AFTER NOVEMBER 15 FOR FALL SEMESTER; APRIL 15 FOR SPRING SEMESTER; AND MID-SEMESTER FOR SUMMER SESSIONS:

For any course(s) a student ceases to attend after these dates he/she will receive an "F" grade on his/her transcript and there will be no refund.

After the deadline (paragraph 4 above), a student may no longer receive a "W" grade except in an extraordinary situation, with the written authorization of the appropriate academic dean. Request for appeal of the deadline must be made in writing. (Students with Arts and Sciences majors, undeclared majors, or unclassified students must write to the Dean of Arts and Sciences, H-306. Students with Professional Studies majors must write to the Dean of Professional Studies, P-402 and Students with an Education major must write to the Dean of Education P-303.) Such requests must be accompanied by appropriate documentation of the time and nature of the extraordinary circumstances (such as hospitalization) which prevented the student from withdrawing within the required time limits. The academic dean will act upon these appeals, either granting or denying the "W" grade. Regarding refund of tuition charges and fees after the deadline dates, see Refund of Tuition and Fees policy stated on page 14.

NOTE: Non-attendance does not constitute drop or withdrawal. The student will not receive a refund, and will receive a grade of

"F" for the courses in question. An official drop or withdrawal can only be transacted by completing the appropriate forms by the dates and at locations noted above.

STANDARDS OF SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

1. To establish eligibility for assistance from Federal and State financial aid programs, an otherwise eligible student must demonstrate that he/she is progressing toward the completion of his/her degree requirements in a timely manner and with a satisfactory level of achievement, as evidenced by the number of credit hours earned and the cumulative grade point average. Failure to meet the minimum standards specified in these academic regulations may result in a determination of unsatisfactory progress. Any student who is making unsatisfactory progress shall be deemed ineligible for financial aid.

programs: no more than three years after beginning programs (full and part-time) Semesters during which a student is not enrolled are not included in these maximum time frames. For those students who change enrollment status, an average time frame will be used.

3. The University has designed its schedule of minimum achievement to recognize that students change enrollment status. The University also recognizes that the first semesters represent a crucial period of adjustment and that it is reasonable to expect a lower rate of progress during the early part

of a student's academic career. The schedules above specify the minimum grade point average a student must maintain based on the number of semester hours attempted and the minimum number of semester hours a student must have earned at the end of each academic year in order to demonstrate satisfactory academic progress. The number of semester hours a student is required to earn is determined by the number of enrolled semesters (full-time equivalent) since s/he began attendance.

4. Measurement of the number of credit hours earned as a factor in the determination of satisfactory academic progress shall be made at the end of each academic year. However, for each semester and at the time of each institutional certification of an application for a Federal Family Education Loan or a Direct Loan, the University will measure the student's cumulative and semester grade point average and determine his/her compliance with relevant sections of this policy.

5. A student who fails to meet the specified minimum number of earned semester hours shall be considered as making unsatisfactory progress without regard to his/her cumulative grade point average. A student who has earned the required number of semester hours but who has failed to meet the specified minimum cumulative grade point average will be placed on academic probation.

A student on academic probation is considered to be making satisfactory academic progress but is subject to dismissal in accordance with the University's regulations governing academic probation and dismissal. If a student fails to achieve the required grade point average after two academic years, s/he will be considered to be making unsatisfactory progress and will not be eligible for financial aid.

6. Enrollment in non-university level courses, such as those offered through the Academic Foundations Program, may not be used to meet the required level of semester hours earned. Receiving a grade of "W" (withdrawal) affects a student's progress because it does not allow him/her to earn credit for that course. A failing grade will have the same effect, and it will also lower the student's grade point average and bring him/her closer to probation and dismissal. If a student fails to demonstrate satisfactory academic progress because of an excessive number of incomplete grades, no determination of financial aid eligibility will be made until the incomplete(s) is (are) resolved; upon resolution, the determination of satisfactory or unsatisfactory progress shall apply to all periods during which the student's eligibility was suspended. If a student repeats any other course, the semester hours earned in that course will not count towards his/her level of progress, unless the prior grade was an F or W.

7. Those who apply for financial aid but do not meet the above standards will be notified by the Director of Financial Aid that they have lost their eligibility. They will further be advised that, for as long as they remain in good standing, they may continue to enroll for courses at their own expense. A student deemed to be making unsatisfactory progress will remain ineligible for financial aid for the greater of one semester or the time required to achieve the requisite level.

8. A student who is deemed to be making unsatisfactory academic progress may appeal this determination to the Director of Medical and Psychological Services. This appeal must be in writing and must be submitted within two weeks of receipt of official notice of unsatisfactory progress. In reviewing these appeals, the Director of Medical and Psychological Services will take into consideration individual mitigating
