OUR EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING SITES



The community college leadership students will be gathering data on community college baccalaureate programs from state agencies and community colleges in all 50 states using website searches, document review, interviews and focus groups, and other descriptive methods.



Our students at Bucks County Community College will research the CRLA's peer educator training guidelines and develop a training program that builds upon our current framework and aligns with the standards set forth by CRLA.



Camden County College recently launched a President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and the community college leadership students will assist committees aimed at improving social justice and advocacy on campus.



This project is to create assessment plans, including program learning outcomes, assessment instruments, and a schedule of assessment, for programs in County College of Morris's Center for Workforce Development.



The community college leadership students will conduct research to assist with Mercer County Community College's reaccreditation cycle with Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE).



The community college leadership students will assist the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Advisory Council and its task forces with their work towards achieving the newly established strategic goal addressing equitable and inclusive excellence by providing research and assessment support.



NASPA Region II is evaluating its services to community college members and the students will conduct research and make recommendations on ways to engage community college partners.



Rowan College at Burlington County was awarded a Title III grant and our students will research best practices in momentum year, low income and minority male retention, first-year and orientation programs, and faculty development.



Sussex County Community College will be conducting research and assisting the college with completing an application for accreditation by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP).

Dr. Michael Sparrow has served in faculty and higher education administration for more than fifteen years. Mike got his start in higher education in classrooms around the Philadelphia area, teaching history courses at the University of Delaware, Rowan University, and Montgomery County Community College. Mike later transitioned into administration, starting as the Student-Veteran Services Coordinator at Ocean County College. Following OCC, Mike served as the Director of the Academic Success Center at Immaculata University. Eager to return to his Lehigh Valley and community college roots, Mike accepted a position at Northampton Community College, first as the Director of the Learning Center and then as the Associate Dean of Academic Success. Mike concluded his career at NCC as the Dean of Enrollment Management and Retention.

Mike's research interests include academic success initiatives, student learning, student onboarding/orientation, student-veterans, and enrollment/retention strategies. He has published and presented at numerous regional and national conferences on many of these topics. Before his career in higher education, Mike served eight years in the United States Navy and completed two combat deployments. Mike is a product of a community college himself, starting at Northampton Community College before completing an A.B. in history and government and law from Lafayette College. Mike also holds a M.A. in American History from the University of Delaware, a M.S.L. in Legal Studies from the University of Pittsburgh School of Law, and an Ed.D. in Higher Education Administration and Leadership from Northeastern University.



The Ed.D. in Community College Leadership is a practice-focused 55-credit cohort-based online program designed to be completed by working professionals in 3 years.

What makes NJCU different?

- **Practice-focused approach.** Coursework and dissertation are based on the scholarly-practitioner model, meaning the application of theory and research is emphasized.
- Mentoring and experiential learning. Students engage with mentors in the field and gain meaningful project-based learning experiences in the community college setting.
- High-levels of support with a program evaluation dissertation. Students receive individual guidance as they identify a problem of practice and evaluate a program, practice, or policy.
- Online, cohort-based approach. Engaging asynchronous learning experiences combined with occasional live online sessions.
