


NURSING DEPARTMENT NEWS

In addition, from 2013 - 2019, Kappa Eta received the Sigma excellence awards for chapter activities.



CONNIE SOBON SENSOR, PHD, RN, CTN-A



Connie is a 1981 graduate of the RN-BSN Program in the Nursing Department. She obtained a diploma in nursing from Englewood Hospital School of Nursing; earned an MSN from Kean University and a PhD from Seton Hall University with a research focus on global health and the power of culturally responsive nursing. She is a faculty member in the Nursing Department at Rutgers University. She is an active member of Sigma, the International Honor Society of Nursing with extensive leadership experience at the international, regional and chapter levels of Sigma. Additionally, Dr. Sensor is the president of the Northeast Chapter of the Transcultural Nursing Society.

Connie was recognized at the recent Sigma Theta Tau International biennium in Washington, DC for her expertise as Sigma's liaison to the United Nations (UN) on global health. She has presented and published on many global topics. In July 2019, she presented to the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations (UN) on *Empowering People and Ensuring Inclusiveness and Equality*. In February 2020, she participated in a radio interview with Dr. Joyce Batcheller from the Center on Healthcare Professionals on *OO* that examined global health issues and strategies for nurses to engage in the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

As Past President of Kappa Eta chapter at New Jersey City University, Connie remains an active member.

TARA MAZZONE MARKO, RN, MS

Tara, a graduate of the RN-BSN program, presented at the recent 45th Biennial Convention in Washington, DC on her research *A Scoping Review of Nurses' Contributions to Health-Related Wildfire Research*. Her goal is to explore the effects of wildfires on maternal – child health. She earned a MS in Nursing Administration at Seton Hall University and presently is a doctoral student at Washington State University. She is a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) nurse at Redy Children's Hospital and nursing clinical professor at California State University. Tara is co-author of the book, *Neonatal Pain Assessment*. Her experiences in the NICU that identified the critical need for clinicians to monitor pain management in this fragile population was the impetus for the research. Tara was past president of Kappa Eta Chapter of Sigma, the International Honor Society of Nursing. She remains an active member and involved at the local, regional and international levels of Sigma.
