On December 12th, the Black Man Healing Project, in collaboration with the Lee Hagan Africana Studies Center, Ozone, MOCI, and OSP, hosted a free event at NJCU that brought together approximately 50 men from the community.

The evening featured powerful discussions addressing Black male trauma, mental health, relationships, self-care, and healing. Highlights included guest speakers such as Lewis Spears, Director of the Lee Hagan Center, as well as engaging discussion panels, wellness resources, and job opportunities.



GEAR UP/COLLEGE BOUND

This month, a meal drive was successfully hosted, distributing a total of 550 meals to over 170 GEAR UP Scholars, families, staff, and Jersey City community members. The remaining meals were generously donated to SGA, which distributed them to nearly 50 NJCU housing students at West Campus Village, making a positive impact during the holiday season.

Valuable support was provided to students at Innovation High School through multiple tutoring sessions for Dual Enrollment students in Math 175 and Bio 130, assisting them in preparing for finals. Additionally, a guest speaker led a mental health session for 9th graders on December 7th, promoting well-being and awareness. In collaboration with the Department of Supplemental Instruction and Innovation High School, the Math 175 Dual Enrollment students were invited to attend the Supplemental Instruction Study Jam for further academic support and preparation for their finals.

The senior class continues to receive college decisions, with three students officially accepted into NJCU. Despite colder weather, engagement with sessions remains strong, averaging 150 students weekly over four sessions.

MEN OF COLOR INITIATIVE



Over the past month, the Men of Color Initiative (MOCI) has continued to strengthen its community and expand its impact through dynamic programming and meaningful engagement. The Rise and Recharge end-of-semester event was a success, bringing together over 75 attendees for a day of celebration and preparation. The event embodied MOCI's mission to support both the personal and academic growth of its members by offering free haircuts, self-care stations, study sessions, career development resources, and camaraderie.

MOCI co-sponsored The Black Male Healing Project, a transformative session focused on mental health and resilience. The program hosted a conversation with Marquise Watson, a prominent industry leader in sports management who currently works with LeBron James' Uninterrupted and formerly worked with the Philadelphia 76ers. His insights on leadership, resilience, and navigating the sports industry provided inspiration to participants.

Since September 1, 2024, MOCI has grown by adding 87 new members.









TRiO Learning Community [TLC]



Led by TRIO Director Christina Velez, the TLC program successfully submitted the Annual Performance Report (APR). TRIO/TLC achieved its goals for the 2023-2024 academic year, inclusive of the following results:

- · 87% of program students persisted
- · 91% of NJCU TRIO students remain in good academic standing
- · 57% of NJCU TRIO participants obtained their four-year degree

During the holiday season, TRiO/TLC students participated in an escape room experience, utilizing teamwork and problem-solving skills to complete a challenge. The annual group photo was also taken at the Rockefeller Center tree, a historic tradition.

YOUTH CORPS

In November, the Youth Corps launched Cohort 2, welcoming 38 students for orientation—its largest cohort of the year!

Asad Faison led the first-ever Parent Orientation. This event provided parents and guardians of Youth Corps applicants an opportunity to learn about the program's history, services, and offerings. Over breakfast, parents and guardians had the chance to meet Youth Corps staff and ask questions. Following the Parent Orientation, students participated in a two-week orientation that included team-building activities, professional development workshops, life skills training, certifications, and rigorous academic classes designed to strengthen their educational foundation. As part of this orientation, scholars engaged in the first-ever corps-wide Community Service Day at Let's Celebrate Food Pantry and Soup Kitchen in Jersey City. During the event, participants learned about the impact Youth Corps has on the communities it serves, alongside service-learning partners. Together, participants contributed over 200 service hours, unloaded food, and helped the pantry prepare for its annual holiday turkey giveaway.

In the spirit of community, Youth Corps celebrated its annual Thanksgiving meal and potluck. This gathering was particularly meaningful for corps members, many of whom may face difficult circumstances and lack the opportunity to enjoy a traditional holiday meal with loved ones. The program also highlights the achievements of participants in the Career Advancement Program. In November, two students enrolled in Real Estate courses, two began Graphic Design courses at NJCU, and one started an internship with the Hudson County Department of Health and Human Services.

Cohort 1 concluded its 16-week program in November, with eight scholars successfully passing three or more of their GED exams. The remaining students are continuing their studies and preparing to retest by the end of the program year.
